





Poley's Place

Situated on the banks of the beautiful springfed Barrington River emerging from the foothills of the Barrington Tops

The Property, situated only 8KMs from Gloucester along the picturesque Thunderbolts Way, comprises over 500 acres of rich grazing land including 5 acres of rain forest only a 5 minute walk from the Camping Ground.

"Wangan" as the area was originally known by the aborigines, meaning "water views", can be enjoyed from the higher vantage points of "Grannie's Lookout" and "Grandpa's Lookout." For the less energetic who are looking to relax by the water's edge there are many secluded camping spots with shady Willows and River Oaks.

For The Fisherman

The Barrington River is a great spot for fishing where there are Perch, Mullet, Catfish and Herring. Trout Can be caught further up the river towards the beautiful Barrington Tops.

Barrington Tops

"Poley's Place" also provides an ideal basecamp for exploring the Barrington Tops World Heritage Area.

The Barrington Tops is full of contrasts. Carved out of an ancient volcano, it rises from near sea level to over 1500m. In the lower valleys, you'll find World Heritage-listed subtropical rainforests. Up on the plateau, there is subalpine woodland which regularly sees snow in winter.
